All of creation belongs to God, including the sun, the moon, and the stars of night. All are part of "Our Father's World." May we join with all creation in praise and thanks to God.

# FIRST READING

In the days of Amos, people thought that the day of the LORD would be a time of great victory, but Amos announced that it would be a day of darkness, not light. He said liturgy is no substitute for obedience. The LORD demands justice and righteousness in the community.

<sup>18</sup>Alas for you who desire the day of the LORD! Why do you want the day of the LORD? It is darkness, not light;

<sup>19</sup>as if someone fled from a lion, and was met by a bear; or went into the house and rested a hand against the wall, and was bitten by a snake.

<sup>20</sup>Is not the day of the LORD darkness, not light, and gloom with no brightness in it?

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<sup>21</sup>I hate, I despise your festivals,

and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies.

<sup>22</sup>Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them;

#### Sermon

This past week has been filled with a whirlwind of uncertainty for us in a variety of ways. For example, the close tallies in the Presidential election, the increasing Coronavirus cases in Wisconsin, including Monroe County; and questions as to whether we should gather in-person with extended family members for Thanksgiving. These and other uncertainties have left many of us anxious, uneasy and uncomfortable. We are hearing dissenting voices, perhaps even our own internal voices, calling us to do, or not to do any number of things! As a result, we may be finding it harder to be our true selves and to walk on the path that God encourages us to take.

When we initially hear our scripture passage from the Book of Amos, we may be uncomfortable and confused by its message. Amos is a prophet who is communicating God's thoughts to the Israelite people. But, we don't understand...Why is God calling the "day of the Lord," "darkness, not light." Why is God comparing it to someone "bitten by a snake in their house?" Why is God angry about the Israelite's worship, their festivals and solemn assemblies, their offerings of animals and grain, and their music? What are the Israelites doing while worshiping God that is so terrible?

To answer these questions, we must first understand that this pericope is <u>less</u> about the external actions of the Israelites during worship, and <u>more</u> about their <u>internal</u> actions! <u>It is about what is going on in their hearts and minds!</u> Knowing this, and after considering this pericope in <u>its context</u>, we gain a better understanding of the message God is communicating to them and all who read this pericope.

It is the 8th Century, BCE (i.e. Before the Christian Era). Amos is a shepherd, a farmer who has been called by God to be a prophet. God has told Amos his concerns about the Israelite people-- the wealthy are abusing the poor. The poor are being forced into debt, and when they

cannot pay what they owe, they are being sold into slavery. Yet, <u>the</u> <u>wealthy do not see their actions as unjust! They continue to participate</u> <u>in the "light" of worship, acting as if they are pious, holy people! But, their lives are in fact, "darkened," by their abuse and mistreatment of the poor.</u>

Prior to our pericope, in Amos, Chapter 4, we hear about what God has done <u>for</u> the people of Israel. God has done amazing, marvelous, merciful things for them! We also hear what God will do <u>to</u> them if they do not heed God's warnings and change their ways. Chapter 4 tells about God's degradation of the wealthy who oppress the poor (4:1-3), their transgressions involving hypocritical animal sacrifices and artificial piety (4:4-5), how God has tried to encourage them to return to God (Amos 4:6-11), and the proclamations of what they need to do, as God states what, <u>"I will do to you, O Israel."</u> (Amos 4:12-17)

But the people continue in their unjust ways. So, now, in Chapter 5, God is really angry! God is condemning their worship, because their hearts are calloused and hardened to their neighbors. Their worship is a mockery of true worship, a joyous festival without true reverance. They are sinning and disrespecting God, and even though God forewarned them of their evil ways, God's words appear to be a surprise to many of the Israelite people!

Fast forward to today. What we are experiencing, what we are living with on a daily basis, may be causing anguish, frustration and even fatigue within us. We are tired of the divisiveness--of angry words, of mudslinging, of incivility, of injustices directed toward others, of racial tensions, and more. Some persons are saying, "I've had enough. I am going to do what I want to do." They are giving up, and perhaps... even moving away from God, God's path and God's command to love one's neighbor as oneself. This is what God is cautioning us about in our

pericope today. Now is not the time to focus on our own external wants, our privileges, our power, our fame, or our own selfish desires! Now is not the time to listen to those who are promoting discord, unrest, strife and hatred in an attempt to draw us into their own ways of thinking and behaving. Now is not the time to abandon our neighbors. Now is not the time to deviate from God's path that moves us toward, not away from, justice and righteousness!

In Amos 5:24 we hear these words: "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." Let us pause, and reflect deeply, in our innermost beings, on these words. "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." We live in a country in which justice is to be for all people, not just a chosen few. Yet, there are many persons who do not know what justice and peace truly mean! The divisiveness, hatred, and injustices that they experience, do not communicate the justice and righteousness that God desires for us.

Righteousness comes to us as Christians through Christ's death on the cross. Jesus personally bore the sins of <u>all</u> humanity, so that those who believe in him might have eternal life. Through our one baptism, we become children of God, and the Holy Spirit works within us to strengthen our faith. <u>Our sins are washed away, and evil is drown within us! But, we must daily die to sin and rise to new life in Christ! <u>Daily, we must move away from the sins that weigh us down; sins that weigh heavily on our hearts and minds!</u> The waters of baptism remind us of "justice [that] rolls down like waters," and "righteousness like an everflowing stream." For, Martin Luther described the waters of baptism as "a flood of grace." <u>Baptism reveals God's grace which is poured out for us through our faith in God and Christ's death and resurrection</u>. And it is in our baptismal vows that we are called to "care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace." (<u>ELW</u>, p. 228).</u>

We are people of faith who receive forgiveness of sins and right-eousness from Christ, not from our works. We receive God's ever-flowing grace as a free gift! We are called to love God and neighbor-old and young, rich and poor, of all colors, abilities, ethnicities, whether friend or foe. Yes, God even calls us to love our enemies and to pray for them! God directs us, leads us, and encourages us to walk the path of justice and righteousness for the sake of humanity! God calls us to love God and one another, to demonstrate kindness, and to be God's faithful servants promoting justice and righteousness on earth.

The prophet, Micah, in the Book of Micah, verses 6:8, shares with us another familiar passage about justice and righteousness. Hear these words, spoken in response to an individual seeking to know what God requires: "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" Amen.
