Dear brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,

I hope you all had a very Merry Christmas.

Last summer in our vacation Bible school, the children of St. Paul's studied the armor of God as found in Ephesians 6:10-20. When we read this passage, we find that God has given us what we need to fight the battles in our lives. The truth is we have a real enemy. The Apostle Paul uses a military metaphor based on the Roman soldier's armor. We all know that Jesus defeated our enemy when he died on the cross and rose from the dead on Resurrection Sunday. The 2023 Budget of \$94,360 was presented as approved by the Council. Motion by Larry Ballwahn, 2nd by Dixie Arndt to accept the 2023 Budget. MC

The Nominating Committee of Bud Osteboe, Larry Ballwahn and Steve Brandau presented the following candidates: Motion by Nalani Bever, 2nd by Barb Ornes to elect Joel Arndt as President Elect, Motion by Addison Arndt, 2nd by John Ornes to elect Emily Bever as Secretary, Motion by Barb Ornes, 2nd by Barb Bever to affirm Ayawyn Conner for her 2nd year, and Jerry Von Haden for his 2nd two year term, Motion by Greg Bever, 2nd by Karen Arzt to elect Barb Bever to complete a one-year term of Joel Arndt, Motion by Karen Arzt, 2nd by Dixie Arndt to elect Kirsten Arndt and Rachel Conner for 2 year terms. All motions affirmed.

Old Business: Justin reported the organ installation is going forward. Some minor adjustments had to be made to the space and will be completed soon.

Justin also gave a brief synopsis of the progress on the front steps project. The initial designs were deemed too expensive for our congregation. The architect and contractor are working on additional plans.

New Business: Addison Arndt, Rachel Conner and Kirsten Arndt gave a summary of the Transition Committee findings. Options for St. Paul's are an ELCA mult-parish ministry, a co-op with a non-ELCA congregation, becoming a satellite congregation of a larger church, a half-time pastor, if one could be found, or a lay-led ministry. Based on the findings the recommendation of the committee is to explore a co-op ministry with an ELCA congregation. Motion 2nd by Larry Ballwahn. Motion by Pam Brandau, 2nd by Bud Osteboe to explore the requirements to employ Karen Sparks as a lay minister. MC

President's Comments: Justin reported that the kitchen renovation in the parsonage is completed. Much appreciation to Lori Brueggen and Nalani Bever for all the work done around the church and parsonage. Thank you for continued support of St. Paul's and the Council.

Bud Osteboe offered an acclamation of appreciation to Justin Arndt, Arlis Ballwahn, Angie Gruen and April Kroeger for their service on the Council.

821 million people around the world - that's more than 1 in 10 - can't access the food they need to live active, healthy lives.

According to the most recent estimates, 736 million people live in extreme poverty on less than \$1.90 per day. That's 10% of the

world's pop-

Hunger is all the same... Right? Sometimes people have said to me, "Why worry about hungry people in other countries? We have hungry people right here. We should take care of them first." My reply is, "It's not the same."

There are three levels of hunger:

<u>Level1: Undernourishment:</u> the person is not getting enough nutrition to meet the minimum needs for an active life.

Level 2: Malnutrition: When the person is so badly nourished they are susceptible to infection & disease

<u>Level 3: Wasting:</u> When the person has acute malnutrition leading to substantial weight loss & death.

The hungry people around here are probably in Level One:
 Undernourished. Maybe, occasionally someone would get into Level Two. But worldwide it's a different situation. Consider that everyday around 20,000 people die from hunger & hunger-related diseases. They were in Level Three. By far the most of these 20,000 who die are children, through no fault of their own. They may be infants of mothers who are so malnourished themselves that they cannot produce enough milk. They may be orphans whose parents have both died, or they have been abandoned because the parent or parents could no longer afford to feed them. The reasons for hunger are many & complicated.

We do not have the level of poverty & hunger that is experienced in many places in the world. Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying we should ignore the needy here in our area. I'm saying that our outreach to the hungry here & the outreach to world hunger are two different missions. We should not choose one over the other, nor should we consider them the same thing, for it is hunger on two very different levels. Yes, we need to minister to the needs of the hungry in our area, but we cannot ignore the 20,000 that are dying every day.
