Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

The sun is shining today. I don't know about you, but sunshine often lifts my spirits. This is especially true during the winter months

whenthere seem to be more overcast days. Doctors tell us that not getting enough exposure to sunshine can lead to depression or what is known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (S.A.D.). We long for the warmth of the sun's rays and for the light.

We long as well, for positive news, which too lifts our spirits. In a recent PBS Newshour broadcast, a panelist spoke of the many challenges facing our world today. She asked how we are spending our time. Are we focusing on the factionalism, divisiveness, partisanship, and other things that divide us? If we spend too much time each day following social media, reading newspaper articles about the negativity and name-calling that is commonplace, and we look at the polarization in our society, we can easily become caught up in it! She suggests instead, that we make an effort each day to look for the good; for the many positive things that people are doing with and for one another. And I would add from a Christian perspective, to read God's word, to look for the light of Jesus, and to remember that Easter is coming!

We have heard in recent Sunday gospel passages about light--Jesus' light shining at his Transfiguration, Jesus' baptism and the light of the Holy Spirit within us through our own baptisms, and letting our lights shine for all to see. These references to light are especially important as we move into the season of Lent.

Lent is a time that we often associate with darkness, not light. It is a time when we reflect on our lives, our own sinfulness, and our great need for a Savior. We may fast or give up something. We may think of our own need for repentance. We vicariously journey with Christ to Jerusalem during the 40-days of Lent, and perhaps ponder questions of our own mortality. We see dimly, and then more clearly what Christ's great sacrifice means for us and for all humanity.

During our mid-week Lenten Services this year, we will be reflecting on the "I Am" statements of Jesus. Each week we will read and reflect on a Bible passage that reminds us that Jesus brings hope to our lives.

Week 1	"I Am the Door"	John 10:1-10
Week 2	"I Am the Bread of Life"	John 6:35-40
Week 3	"I Am the Good Shepherd"	John 10:11-18
Week 4	"I Am the Light of the World"	John 8:12-20
Week 5	"I Am the Resurrection and the Life"	John 11:17-27

Even during this season of Lent, Jesus is with us every day, walking with us in every step of our Lenten journey and beyond.

The word "focused" is defined in the Oxford Dictionary, as follows: "(of a person or their eyes) adapt to the prevailing level of light and become able to see clearly." This is what we will be doing during the Lenten season--adapting to the level of darkness/light, but not giving up hope, for as we journey together and see more clearly, we will see Christ, who is the "Door", the "Bread of Life," the "Good Shepherd," the "Light of the World," the "Resurrection and the Life." Let us join together as we journey with Christ through the 40-days of Lent, and beyond.

Newly elected Council Members are John Ornes, President Elect, Lori Brueggen, Treasurer, Steve Brandau for his second two-year term and Joel Arndt. They take office immediately.

Steve Brandau has made a temporary repair to the pipe organ. A more permanent repair will cost a minimum of \$8,000 and the organ will be out of service for about 3 months (projected to start sometime after Easter).

The Church Council approved going ahead with the project. There have been some donations and it is a good project for memorial money, but the congregation will need to help.

Contributions should be clearly marked "Organ" on your envelope. A check put in a regular envelope marked Organ Fund would also work well.



A Yearlong Devotional Journey through the Epistles

This is a resource to be used individually, with a companion, or in a small group. The Epistles are divided over 365 days. Each unfolds just as one would open a new letter, beginning in January with Romans and concluding in December with Jude. This is not a bible history, commentary or collection of stories. The purpose is to reflectively engage the text and let the text engage you day by day. (If you miss a day, it is easy to go back and catch up.) The intent of the author is to not veer far from the text, but to prayerfully explore its core message. The Letters speak for themselves. NRSV is the primary version used, occasionally supplemented by other English versions with aid of the original Greek.

Special Congregational Meeting 1-5-2020 ; Begin 11:10 am L. B.

People who made comments:

Justin Arndt, Kirsten Arndt, Lori Arndt, Karen Arzt, Arlis Ballwahn, Doreen Beyer, Greg Bever, Nalani Bever, Pamela Brandau, Lori Brueggen, Carolyn Dougherty, Richard Krause, Bud Osteboe, Lois O'Rourke, and Jerome Von Haden. Plus the young woman who added to the conversation several times: (Katiya Tormoen. Her husband is Seth. Kristi and Scott Tormoen are his parents)

President Justin's introductory comments (and a couple inserted later during discussion):

- Shrinking attendance occurs at many churches, been very pronounced here recently

- Weekly attendance has dropped from 78 in 2012 to 54 in 2019 (24 person decrease in 7 years)

- Possible reasons:

-3 full time pastors & 3 interim pastors in last 7 years

-Older congregation with several deaths

- On current trend, congregation may not be here in 5 to 10 years.

- We know the effect (decreased attendance) but seek your help in finding the cause/problem.

Comment summary:

-People need to realize that God must be a priority in their lives.

-Grandson goes to church in Onalaska and loves it; some churches can draw. It's not that we are necessarily doing anything wrong. Most young people lack commitment to church and service organizations. Too much competition.

-Young people feel judged in this church; noisy children, etc. Was different when Pastor Kathleen was here. As the church is at present, she wouldn't transfer from Brush Creek.

Special Congregational Meeting - continued



This church lacks friendliness.

Must get something out of church related to everyday life. The sermons don't relate enough to this.

The world has changed; the traditional generation doesn't exist anymore. Traditional churches will have to change, but how, to what. The traditional pastor is not likely to be able to become the change agent.

It's the difference in generations.

Let's do something different. Seconded.

When is the last time we had a new member service?

Some larger churches have two services; a traditional and a modern; I don't know how a church of our size does that, but ...

Sports is the priority now, not church - club sports.

Steinbrecher was a traditional pastor but was able to maintain active members with his knowledge and dramatic sermons. Current sermons tend to rehash, explain the Bible verses.

There is no laughter in the church anymore. Everything is too serious.

There is not enough effort to involve the children, no children's sermon. Even Pastor Lindberg didn't do many.

Emphasis of this church is wrong. Need to be an emphasis on what we do during the week. People need to respond to Christ; personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Lutheran churches are teaching the wrong thing - need adult baptism. Not saved by child baptism.

Any time there has been an attempt to change - uproar.

Assembly of God mentioned several times.

Do we need to get rid of the ELCA?

We are a congregation that likes drama in our sermons: Pastor Steinbrecher, Pastor Lindberg (background in acting). Can't make the young people come to church; sometimes life gets in the way.

St. Paul's has tried various things before; even putting invitation on doors. No real gain.

How do you get kids to change? Volleyball (sports) has taken over.

Number of young people in Sunday School, etc. going down.

What happened to the possible merge with Fountain and Hustler?

Suggestion that we plan one service a month that is not so traditional. Pastor said that would be possible if we stayed within the basic Lutheran theology.

Concluded with the Lord's Prayer at 12 pm.



St. Paul's Organ Restoration

While folks are pretty used to wrong notes and unusual key changes coming from the organ (not the fault of the organ), a few months ago it sounded like a windstorm. The leathering on the bellows had pulled away in a few spots and air was escaping. When the organ is turned on, the bellows are filled with air. The picture we have included is an example of a bellow that contains air. It just looks like it is held together with duct tape, but that is not the case.

We have done our best by applying gorilla tape in the areas where air is escaping, but that is about as good as the kid putting his finger in the dike!! The air pressure regulator bellows (technical term for them) need releathering.



Releathering is a key component of pipe organ restoration. Regulator bellows, which are found in pipe organs of every type, require releathering in order to provide a stable supply of wind from the blower motor to wind chests and other components. As leather ages it becomes brittle, causing bellows to leak and eventually blow-out.

The cost of releathering both (large and small) regulators is \$8,000.00. The folks at the annual meeting approved proceeding with the repairs, along with asking for donations to cover the repair costs rather than using existing funds. The approval was for repairs up to and including \$10,000.00 because, and if any you have done remodeling, oftentimes

additional costs are determined once repairs begin.

The bellows will be removed and taken to the repair shop after confirmation on May 17, and we anticipate the repairs will take the entire summer.

To date, a total of \$3,410.00 has been donated. If you wish to make a donation using your offering envelope, please indicate the amount and "organ fund" in the designated "Other" section of the envelope. All other donations, appropriately marked, should be mailed to the church at P O Box 129, Wilton, WI 54670.

FINANCES

January is traditionally a tough month for church offerings. Christmas bills are coming in, with property tax either paid at the end of last year or due in January. For the month of January, our **expenses exceeded our offerings** by \$1,414.28.

Please consider a regular donation to the general fund, which covers the day to day expenses of the church, through online giving. That way, whether you are able to attend service, or not, your financial support will be in attendance, so to speak! An example might be to think about donating \$10.00 a week through online giving and perhaps supplementing your donation, using your envelope, when you are able to attend worship. If you are interested in establishing online donations, please see Nalani for the necessary forms.

PEWS

Many of us have a habit of sitting in the back couple of rows of the church underneath the balcony. It's a tradition; it's our comfort zone. However, over the last decade, the average weekly attendance at Sunday service has decreased by 20-25 people. The conversation of removing pews at the back of the church has occurred for a couple of years. Finally, at the Annual meeting a month ago, the possibility of removing the pews under the balcony was brought up. Generally, the idea was well received, so the back 4 rows of pews will be removed a week or two after Easter.

Why are we doing this? The easy answer would be to say that we want people to sit closer to the front, but it is more than that. A few comments during the Every Member Visit meeting indicated that the congregation is not always the most welcoming. Visiting with guests, friends and neighbors is hard to do when everyone is confined to the pews. This will create an open area to meet and greet people before and after the service. We will potentially have coffee/snacks in this area as well.

Initially, the area will remain open to the sanctuary. In the future, a curtain or wall with windows may be installed. However, we want to keep the area usable for seating for Christmas Eve and larger weddings and funerals. If you have any questions about this, please contact Church Council president Justin Arndt.

To the Parents of our Young Children:

Relax!! God put the wiggle in children; don't feel you have to suppress it in God's House. A Jesus said, "Let the children come to me."

May we suggest...

- Sit toward the front where it is easier for little ones to see and hear what is going on at the altar. They tire of seeing the backs of others' heads.
- Quietly explain the parts of the service and actions of the pastor, acolytes, ushers and others involved in worship.
- Sing the hymns, pray and voice the responses. Children learn how to worship by copying you.
- If your child become too disruptive and you need to leave the service, feel free to do so. But, we hope you come back. All are welcome!
- Remember, the way we welcome children in our church directly affects how they respond to the Church, God, and one another. Let them know they are at home in this house of worship..
- Allow your child to use the coloring books provided, draw, doodle, or write in the books as well.


