Message from Pastor Cathy Morris

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past week, we celebrated Good Shepherd Sunday and remembered Earth Day with a special worship service from Lutherans Restoring Creation. The service highlighted God's creation, Jesus' role as the Good Shepherd, and our role as sheep/created beings.

Today, we continue to ponder these themes as we read Psalm 100-

Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come into his presence with singing. Know that the Lord is God. It is he that made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name. For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations. (Emphasis added, NRSV)

In challenging times, the many gifts that God provides for us can sometimes seem far away. Our thoughts may turn instead, to the pandemic, financial issues, health setbacks, racial injustices in the news, and more. These things can fill our minds and hearts with sadness. But these verses from Psalm 100 remind us that God is the creator of all things, and God's love is steadfast! We are not to lose heart, but to, "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth!" God's love is stronger, God's love is more powerful than the evils of the world. God's love is forever; from everlasting to everlasting!

Presiding Bishop Eaton's sermon for Good Shepherd Sunday included these words--

We make a mistake, and we miss a lot I think when we try to walk away from our own creatureliness, when we try to somehow escape this world that we're in and are not able to recognize that God still cares about and is still creating this place, this earth, this cosmos, all of it. been called to tend this garden that God has given to us and so when we disavow somehow our own creatureliness, I think we set ourselves off and apart from God. (Transcribed for Good Shepherd Sunday, April 25, 2021.)

How might we acknowledge our creatureliness? How might we connect with God's creation, rather than "set ourselves off and apart from God?" How might we recognize and acknowledge that God's work in the world is not done!

Perhaps we can start simply, by looking for other creatures during walks in the neighborhood, at county and state parks, at Kickapoo Valley Reserve, and Wildcat Mountain State Park. You can bring your camera, and as you walk, you can take photos of some of the creatures you see. Or, you can create your own scavenger hunt form filled with the names of various birds and animals, and check them off as you see them. Or, you can take your sketch pad and draw pictures. Perhaps you too will espy a cardinal nestled in a tree, or three deer (one of them hiding) before you! (See photos.) How fun it is to be able to look back at the pictures, and remember your encounter with God's creatures and your own creatureliness!





We can also enjoy the flowers, shrubs, trees and other flora that grow in the rich soil of God's earth. A field of daffodils may greet you, too, on your next hike! (See photo).

Taking our next steps, we can look to our own carbon footprint and ways in which we can reduce, reuse, and/or recycle on a daily basis. We can compost food waste, use water from a rain barrel for watering plants, plant a vegetable garden, recycle plastic and metal, donate items we don't use anymore to a worthy cause, and more. How we go about making positive changes, begins by looking at our own lives, and taking steps that will make a difference to God, God's creatures, and God's earth.

No matter what challenges life may present you, remember that God has given you, and all created beings, God's beautiful garden to tend, and God's many other creatures to care for and enjoy. How will you stay connected to God and God's creatures? By celebrating today and every day, our creatureliness, and God's creation, as we do our part to help conservation efforts and "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all ye earth!" Thanks be to God.

When this pandemic first started, no one expected the church's sanctuary to be closed to weekly services for over 13 months. The severity

and transmissibility of this virus has been relentless and it has touched many of our families. As daily cases locally have become low and the percentage of vaccinated congregation members continue to increase, the church council has decided to return to in sanctuary services starting this coming Sunday (May 2nd).

As exciting as this news is, it is not a complete return to pre-pandemic times. The virus is still present in our community and not all members are vaccinated. Several precautions will be put in place for the safety of everyone.

Wearing a mask is required.

Please maintain physical distancing inside the sanctuary.

Seating will be restricted to every other pew.

Songs will be led from the front of the church; we ask that the congregation speak the words or hum along only. If you or your family would like to lead songs, please contact Nalani.

Disinfecting of pews and commonly touched surfaces will take place weekly.

Besides the above precautions, you will notice a couple other differences initially – services will be a shorter and you will not hear the organ (see organ article). We will continue monitoring the pandemic and update precautions regularly.

Finally, I would like to thank you for your continued support of St. Paul's. The last year has been challenging to all of us. We appreciate your patience and understanding as have worked to keep our congregation safe and continue to do so in the months ahead.

First Quarter Financial Figures

The first quarter 2021 (January-March) offerings totaled \$17,821.43 while our expenses were \$21,858.08, or \$4,036.65 in excess of our offerings.

For comparison sake, we held first quarter 2020 services in the sanctuary, with the exception of March 22 & 29, and the expenses exceeded our offerings by \$4,315.00.

It would appear, pandemic or not, the first quarter has proven a challenge perhaps caused by property taxes, income taxes, and other typical household expenses during the first quarter, regardless of the year.

FAMILY FARM PROJECT (update) La Crosse Area Synod 2020-2021

The emphasis for the 2020 Synod Assembly was to have been "Synod Barn Raising". Since the Assembly was not held last year, the Project has been extended into 2021. Each Congregation was given a barn cut-out to decorate and use

as a goal. Our barn was painted and decorated by Ayawyn Conner. Thank you, Ayawyn. The cost of a "Family Farm" through ELCA Good Gifts is \$715. Each Congregation is encouraged to provide several "farms".

St. Paul's has to date raised enough to purchase 3 farms through the Christmas Angel Project, W-ELCA donation and personal contributions toward World Hunger. Can we do better? The 2021 Assembly will be held virtually in June. Please consider a donation for World Hunger. Each farm includes a cow, two goats, two pigs, a dozen chickens, seeds, tools and agricultural training.



Organ Renovation





Organ Renovation Update

The renovation is currently at a standstill as we await the replacement of the tall pipes that sit in the very back of the organ chamber. These were considerably damaged over the years because of water leaking into the chamber and the damaged plaster falling on them. The other interesting fact is the pipes are made of lead, a soft metal, easily bent or mangled. The good news, which we just learned today (4/26), is the pipes that we thought totally beyond repair, have indeed been repaired!!

We have raised approximately \$19,000.00 toward the cost of the renovation, which will probably end up in the area of \$25,000.00. You will recall, Marlene Korth donated \$25,000.00 in honor and memory of her mother Louella Martalock, a longtime organist at St. Paul's. When it appeared nothing was going to be done with the organ, we placed \$8,500.00 in an account and applied the remaining funds to the restoration of the large stain glass window on the south side of the sanctuary. (In Honor of Louella & Pete Martalock by Gary & Marlene Korth).

Fast forward to this project. For all practicable purposes we have replenished the funds used for the stain glass window and are nearing the entire use of the remaining funds donated by the Korths.

We will certainly continue to accept donations to the organ fund with the ultimate goal of donations covering the entire project.

Every Member Visit Recommendations

At the request of the council, the every member visit committee met to provide recommendation based on the congregational surveys completed last year.
