As I was thinking about the scripture passage (above), I was reminded of both God and humankind. We are to love God with our whole selves. We are to love God first and foremost above everything. During this time of the Coronavirus, so many things in our lives have changed. For some, it is that their emotional well-being that has been challenged due to not being able to visit loved ones at home or in care centers, feelings of sadness regarding all the things that are happening, etc.

#### ORGAN BELLOWS REPAIR UPDATE

Repair of the organ bellows was approved at the annual meeting in January. Council was authorized to spend up to \$10,000.00, with the actual repair bid being \$8,000.00.

The additional \$2,000.00 represents a contingency fund if additional repairs are determined once the project begins.

(Pretend these are bellows)

- Contingency Fund

We have received donations toward this project in the amount of \$7,569.00. WOW!!! Thank you to one and all.



Our contractor, Fred Hermes, will be removing the bellows in the near future. We anticipate the work will take 3 to 4 months.

I found the original contract with Wangerin Organ Company of Milwaukee, dated March 19, 1950. The contract called for Wangerin to "build for and erect in St. Paul Ev. Lutheran Church, Wilton, Wisconsin, a Pipe Organ, in accordance with the Specifications, complete and ready for use within six months". The contract was in the amount of \$5,675.00. A down payment of \$1,765.00 was required to begin the work. The folks signing on behalf of St. Paul's were

Ellsworth A. Thurow, Karl Kruse, Charles G. Stark, Leonard Brandau, and Edward Heinz.

I was told the organ came out of a church in Milwaukee, so finding the contract totally threw me for a loop!! The contract is pretty clear that the Wangerin folks constructed the organ from the ground up, and did not remodel or remake an existing organ. Learn something everyday!!
